## ICANSPELL LESSON 4/13

The ICANSPELL WORDS on this page contain the consonant team ph, as in the word you might use when you smell something awful-phooey! Sometimes ph is found at the beginning of a word, as in Philip and photo. Sometimes it is found in the middle of a word, as in orphan and phosphate. And sometimes it is found at or near the end of a word, as in telegraph. In most words containing ph, these letters say the sound of $f$. Phone sounds like fore, but we do not spell it that way!

Once in awhile the two letters $p$ and $h$ keep their own sounds even when they are together, as they are in shepherd. They do not say $f$. What in the world would a sheferd be? The word shepherd is broken into two syllables, shep + herd, and it means sheep herder. You need to say the first syllable as it sounds and then say the second syllable (though the h almost disappears), so you cannot combine the $\mathrm{p}+\mathrm{h}$. In words like this, you cannot say ph like $f$ because the $p$ belongs to a separate syllable from the $h$.

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[^0]:    Draw a picture of a teeter-totter. On the left end of the
    ! teeter-totter print ph and on the right end print an $f$.
    i Make sure the teeter-totter is level, because the ph = the f. Now study the first eleven words while keeping the picture of the teeter-totter in front of you. When you get to the ph part of each word, point to the ph on the teetertotter and then slide your finger to the f. Remember that ph says $f$, but is spelled ph. In the last three words the $p$ and $h$ are in separate syllables. To illustrate this, draw a ! knife cutting between the $p$ and the $h$ of each one. That's ; where the syllable break is, so ph cannot say $f$. To prove that the $p$ and $h$ in the first eleven words cannot be broken ! into separate syllables, try saying them as if they were!
